LOCAL EDUCATIONAL ATTAINMENT COLLABORATIVES

15 Serving 42 Counties

myFutureNC partnered with the UNC School of Government's ncIMPACT Initiative to establish 15 Local Educational Attainment Collaboratives representing 42 counties throughout NC. In partnership with Carolina Demography, local attainment goals have been recommended for every county to consider, and these cross-sector partnerships have either adopted those local goals or set their own to feed into the statewide 2 million by 2030 goal. myFutureNC supports the work through our regional impact managers who help teams and other emerging collaborations develop best practices for implementation.





REGIONAL IMPACT MANAGERS

Increased from 4 to 8

We expanded our Regional Impact Manager (RIM) Team from 4 to 8 to align with the 8 prosperity zones aligned with NC Commerce and the Department of Public Instruction. RIMs support the unique and differentiated attainment journeys in each county by supporting and activating resources; however, depending on the need, they may also provide direct support and coaching.

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FAFSA CAMPAIGN

NC Increased from 27th to 15th Nationally

As the result of a spring 2022 10-week FAFSA campaign North Carolina moved from a ranking of 27th to 15th nationally, and **12,827** additional students completed the FAFSA.

Why is it important for every high school senior to complete the FAFSA?


Completion of the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) is required for students to be eligible for Federal Pell grants, state need-based grants, and scholarships. Increasing FAFSA completion rates continues to be a statewide focus, as research indicates that students who complete the FAFSA are more likely to attend college and persist in their studies.

NC RECONNECT

Cohort 3

With approximately 329,000 North Carolinians ages 25-44 having some college but no degree, NC Reconnect, a pilot program sponsored by the John M. Belk Endowment, in partnership with myFutureNC, the NC Community College System, and the Belk Center for Community College Leadership and Research, has expanded to five additional community colleges. This initiative is aimed at enrolling and credentialing adult learners. Brunswick, Catawba Valley, College of The Albemarle, Davidson-Davie and Edgecombe community colleges are the third cohort of institutions to participate in this initiative and receive partner support.

A new resource for community colleges across the state, the <u>Adult Learner Guidebook</u> synthesizes lessons learned from the NC Reconnect "Better Skills, Better Jobs" campaign, which was launched by <u>John M. Belk Endowment</u> in 2021 to reengage with adult learners who had some college credit but no degree or credential.





NC WORKFORCE CREDENTIALS

To remain economically competitive, North Carolina must meet the talent pipeline needs and create opportunities for all. The NC Workforce Advisory Council, facilitated by myFutureNC, is comprised of employers and education and workforce development partners from across the state. The Council is focused on ensuring non-degree training being offered by our education and workforce development systems is aligned with the needs of business and industry. The Council continues to convene and endorse industry-valued, non-degree credentials, while also providing input on communication and outreach efforts to promote credentials, increase access to credentials, and build the state's capacity for credential data tracking.

DRIVING AWARENESS

State-Led, But Locally Owned and Driven

In order to accelerate the good work underway across the state, myFutureNC continues to create spaces for education and workforce leaders at the state and local levels to collaborate on high-impact strategies, especially those that affect students at key transition points in the education continuum. In 2022, myFutureNC co-hosted the following convenings.

- 8 convenings—one per each NC Prosperity Zone—in partnership with North Carolina State's Institute for Emerging Issues, bringing together local leaders from all sectors (representation from 90 of all 100 NC counties). These powerful opportunities helped to jumpstart county-specific conversations to increase attainment locally.
- 7 convenings in partnership with Leadership North Carolina to inform, develop, and engage committed leaders by broadening their understanding of and involvement in issues and opportunities facing the state pertaining to educational attainment.

In 2023, the convenings will focus on underserved populations.

IDENTIFY & ADVOCATE FOR POLICY SOLUTIONS

The state's biennium budget, approved by the General Assembly and signed by the Governor in July, 2022, continues to move myFutureNC's priorities forward including:

ACADEMIC READINESS

- Reimbursement rates for NC Pre-K providers were increased by \$9 million.
- The budget included \$14.6 million in funding for 124 literacy coaches and early learning specialists, in line with the statewide push for the Science of Reading which aligns with myFutureNC's priorities.

COLLEGE & CAREER ACCESS

 \$55,000 was provided to the NC State Education Assistance Authority to support the FAFSA Tracker Tool.

POST-SECONDARY COMPLETION

- A \$500,000 grant was directed to myFutureNC to study creation of an interconnected, real-time data system to facilitate communication and transition of students between public schools, community colleges, and universities.
- Included recurring funding totaling \$160,000 for the purchase of National Student Clearinghouse attainment data. This data is essential to myFutureNC's 100 county attainment profiles and statewide dashboard.
