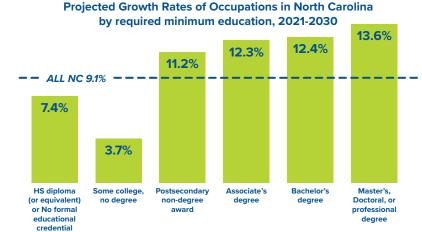
NC WORKFORCE CREDENTIALS

North Carolina Workforce Credentials is a collaborative effort to identify industry-valued, non-degree credentials that help workers in North Carolina obtain in-demand, living wage jobs. While Foundational credentials are an initial stepping stone, Essential or Career credentials put you on a pathway to a higher-wage career.

CREDENTIAL CATEGORIES

Foundational Credentials

Credentials demonstrating standard or baseline skillsets

Examples: Safety, Soft Skills, ServSafe

Essential Credentials

Credentials with Pathways leading to sustainablewage careers

Examples: Vet Tech, Nurse Aide I, Pharmacy, Technician, Construction Labor

Career **Credentials**

Credentials supporting sustainable-wage careers

Examples: CDL, Law Enforcement, Lineworker, **HVAC Technicians**

Advanced Credentials

Credentials supporting career progression

Examples: Marine Welding, Certified Cisco Network Professional, Computed Tomography

NC WORKFORCE CREDENTIALS

You can earn Essential or Career credentials for high-demand industries through North Carolina Community Colleges and other training partners or sometimes even in high school. Many can be attained in as short as six weeks to three months.
